

SOCIAL MEDICINE

Becoming a life-long learner has never been as widespread of a topic as it is today. Americans are living longer, and what it means to age is very different than what it meant years ago. Libraries have the unique challenge of providing accessible, equitable, and meaningful services to a growing population.

In the field of public service, there is no one-size-fits-all model, and the library is no exception. Seniors are a diverse group. Some are retired, while others work full- or part-time jobs; some are tech-savvy, and others are not; family surrounds some, and others live isolated and alone. Aging mentally and physically affects people differently, and people take on varied identities as they age. Libraries have the unique responsibility to think about patrons in all stages of life.

How do libraries serve a population with such diverse needs? The Customer Service Department at the Oak Lawn Public Library understands that a mix of programming opportunities and services helps make libraries more inclusive and welcoming for all. Customer Services staff think intentionally about active aging. This work goes beyond the library alone: community partnerships with senior service advocates, mental and physical health professionals, and local and state community agents are essential to a holistic approach to addressing this community's emerging needs.

With this in mind, librarians and staff work alongside our community to create focused programs for seniors. Take care of your health with Take Charge of Your Health (begins 1/16), or our series of talks with Advocate Health (1/22, 1/29, 2/8). Spanish language speakers can learn about their Medicare options with Medicare 101 en Español (12/2). To achieve healthier physical outcomes, perhaps try Yoga for Adults Ages 60 and Over (2/21). To maintain and improve cognition health, check out our Memory Kits designed in partnership with Rush University Hospital to combat dementia. Reduce social isolation while by meeting someone new, or bring a friend to Who's Got Game or Wits Workout (1/30 and 2/27). Grab a Take & Make Craft just for seniors and complete a craft project in the comfort of your home. Or, give back to a senior returning home from a hospital stay by donating to Help Us Create Care Baskets for Older Adults (through February).

Putting it all together is in itself a challenge, but rewarding work. So next time you visit the Library, remember that it's a space of life-long learning and that knowledge never stops! Stay curious!



Are you interested in learning how to find or create 3D print designs? Stop by **3D Printing Basics** on Tuesday, Jan. 16 or Feb. 13 from 6-7 p.m. in the Computer Training Center. We'll introduce you to Tinkercad, a free online 3D modeling program. (This class requires basic computer skills.)

Learn how you can use this database to prepare your resume at **New Resume with JobNow** on Wednesday, Dec. 6 or Feb. 7 from 10-11 a.m. in the Computer Training Center.
